

Adolescent Opioid Abuse in the Midst of an Epidemic: A Nursing Perspective

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Opioid Deaths

- Daily approximately 46 people die from prescription opioids
- Approximately 28.29% of deaths are females
- Approximately 71.71% of deaths are males
- Prescription and Non-prescription opioid deaths were 5 times higher in 2016 compared to 1999
- Heroin use has doubled among adolescents aged 18-25 over the last decade
- Heroin overdoses have quadrupled since 2010
- Synthetic opioid death rates increased by 72.7% in past 5 years
 - Tramadol and fentany

Government Recommendations

- Increase federal funding of Opioid/ Substance Abuse programs
- Increase opioid addiction prevention programs in adolescents
- Collaborate with the Department of Education
 - Develop student evaluation and supportive programs for middle school, high school, and college aged students
- Improve referral strategies
- Increase media campaigns through collaboration with the private sector and non-profit organizations
 - Focus on prevention, education and access to resources
- Prescription Drug Monitoring Programs (PDMP)
 - Encourage mandating provider PDMP usage
 - Integrate PDMP data with other electronic resources
 - health records and overdoses/naloxone use
 - Collaborate with Department of Transportation and Health care agencies
- Update regulations for electronic prescriptions of controlled substances

Implementing Government Interventions

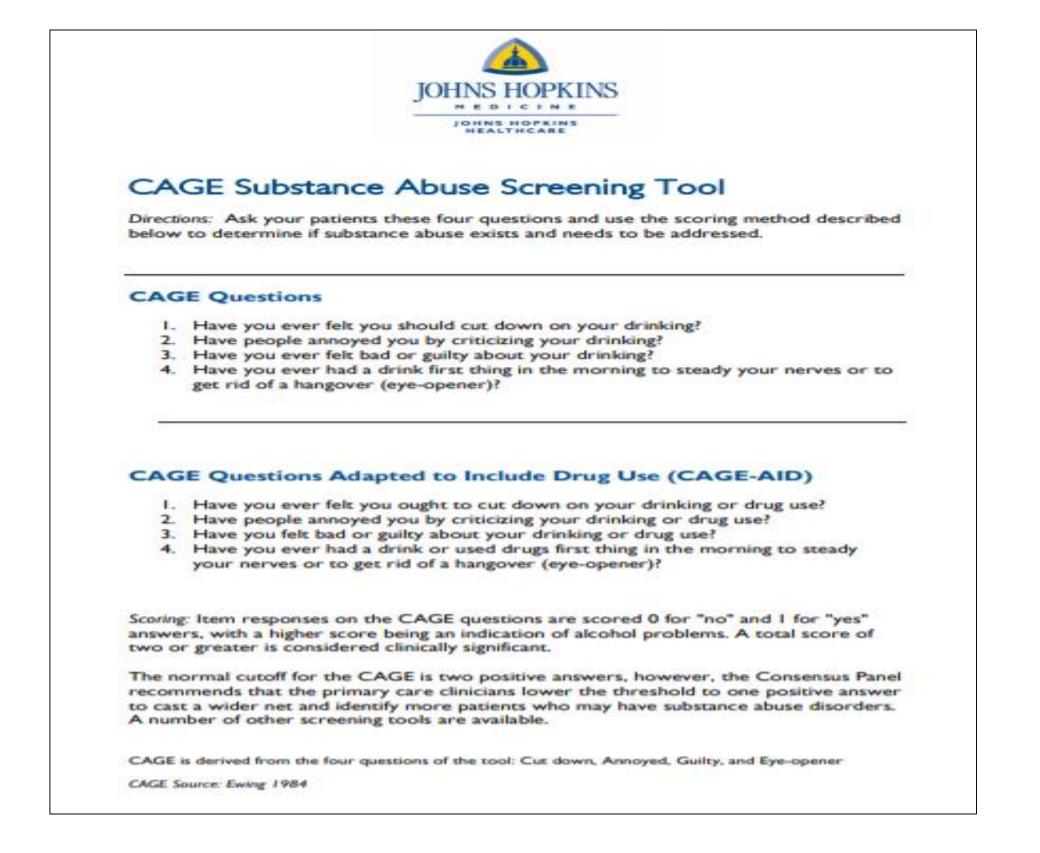
- **Institute the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP)**
 - Organize national drug policies and guidelines
- Streamline state resources to report life-saving activities
- Identify appropriate allocation of funds
- **Enhance effective funding of opioid-related programs**
 - ONDCP oversight
 - Collaboration between federal and state programs
- **Opioid Addiction Prevention**
 - Focus on vulnerable populations: adolescent and college aged students

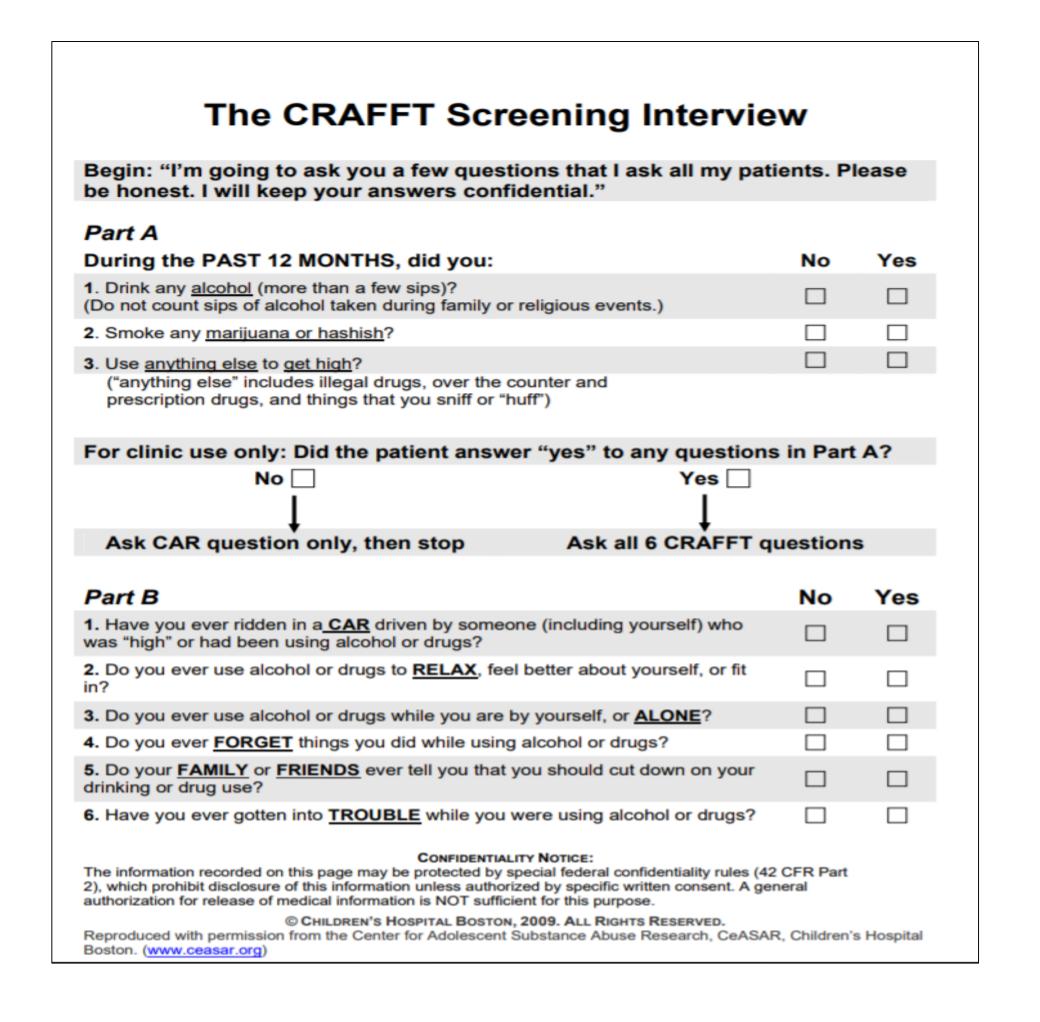
Education focus in primary and secondary schools

- Risks and consequences of drug abuse
- Signs of substance and drug abuse for parents and teens
- Addiction is treatable
- Establish evidence based prevention programs
 - Target high risk populations and individuals
 - Reduce risk factors
 - Increase prevention of substance abuse
- Provide early intervention for risk for drug misuse
- Mass media education campaigns
 - Drug prevention on harmful effects of opioid use
 - Identify easy access to opioid prevention programs
 - Mirror an effective media campaign i.e. The Real Cost
 - A successful campaign educating teens, 12-17 years, about the harmful effects of tobacco use

Nursing Initiatives

Screening everyone! Vital Assessment for All





- **Develop Parent Education Tools on Substance Abuse and Warning Signs**
- Expedient access to opioid treatment within geographical location
 - Provide handouts of available resources
- Increase provider availability for medication-assisted treatment
- Nurse practitioners and physician assistants may prescribe buprenorphine with training
- Increase Prescriber education on responsible prescribing
- Develop Deterrent formulations of opioids for transformation from tablet to powder for abuse
- **Role of PDMPs**
- Increase awareness and number of registered prescribers to curb illegal availability of prescription opioids
- Increase access to naloxone for first responders, families and friends of known substance abuse users

Rhode Island's Initiatives

- **Increase access to naloxone**
- Increase access to resources for posttreatment of opioid overdose
- Increase awareness of opioid statistic and resources
- Develop a Drug Overdose Death Review Team
- **Implement Opioid Prevention Media Campaigns**
- Evaluate mandatory laws surrounding prescriber PDMPs usage, naloxone access, and 48-Hour Opioid Overdose Reporting
- **Enhance access to Community Health Navigators for recovery**
- **Encouraging Provider education on PDMP and prescribing** guidelines

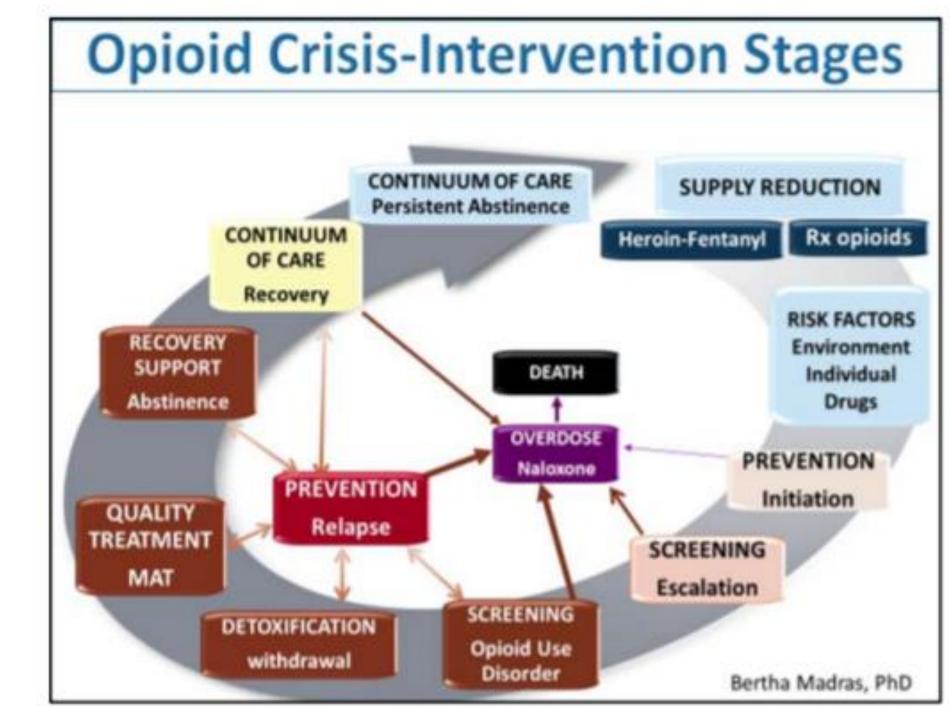


Figure 4. Opioid Crisis-Intervention Stages
