- Initially established as Sigma Theta Tau
- Expanded to Sigma Theta Tau International as voted by the House of Delegates at the 1985 Biennial Convention
- More than 745 Institutions formally engaged with STTI, through...
 - 531 chapters, located in...
 - 30 countries
- Over 135,000 members, in...
 - 92 countries...





STTI's Responsibilities

- Submit annual evaluation report re: United Nations related activities
- Complete quadrennial report
- Promote knowledge of United Nations
- Disseminate information about United Nations principles and activities
- Communicate NGO Relations' e-mails
- Help advance the U.N.'s goals, objectives and initiatives, such as Sustainable Development Goals



ECOSOC: Special Consultative Status

STTI received ECOSOC Special Consultative status in July 2012

Access gained with ECOSOC Special Consultative Status:

- May be requested to provide expert analysis on global health
- May make written and oral statements concerning nursing and global health at U.N. events (invited)
- May serve on health-related committees
- May attend international U.N. conferences, events and meetings




































SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOAL 3

Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages



3.4	By 2030, reduce by one third premature mortality from non-	
	communicable diseases through prevention and treatment and promote	
	mental health and well-being	

- 3.4.1 Mortality rate attributed to cardiovascular disease, cancer, diabetes or chronic respiratory disease
- 3.4.2 Suicide mortality rate
- **3.5** Strengthen the prevention and treatment of substance abuse, including narcotic drug abuse and harmful use of alcohol
- **3.5.1** Coverage of treatment interventions (pharmacological, psychosocial and rehabilitation and aftercare services) for substance use disorders
- **3.5.2** Harmful use of alcohol, defined according to the national context as alcohol per capita consumption (aged 15 years and older) within a calendar year in litres of pure alcohol







Questions to consider for chapter activities:

- Chapter's overall membership experience?
- Interests/professional needs of different types of members?
- Does it meet the mission, purposes, and goals of STTI?
- What is the educational component in this activity?
- Does it provide value to the member?
- How can we take it to the next step?



Example #1

Made comfort bags for children removed from their homes. The bags include drinks, snacks, toothbrush/ toothpaste, blanket or stuffed animal, and a toy, game or activity to keep their hands and minds busy during such a stressful time. The students went above and beyond in providing all the items, decorating the bags, filling the bags with age appropriate items, and helping deliver them to the organization. Additionally, the students were given a presentation on child abuse including statistics, signs of abuse, and how to help prevent abuse/neglect. The students then broke up into groups and rotated through six stations including:

- *Role play- interviewing a child on suspected abuse/ neglect
- *Reviewing community resources
- *A selfie station to raise awareness via social media
- *The bag filling station
- *Make a card for your bag

Example #2

New member groups applied for mini grants (USD 350.00 maximum) to support projects that met a need to serve a vulnerable population. One group assessed nutritional needs for school age children in rural settings. Through their efforts, education was provided related to healthy snacking and importance of exercise in two rural schools. Another new member group assessed needs of preschool/day care located in a rural area. The focus was that of a safe environment though education related to preventing disease and awareness of safety when playing outside. Both groups provided reports back to the chapter when projects were completed.

Example #3

Each of the three nursing schools affiliated with the chapter hold annual pizza parties in the fall for the juniors/seniors that are eligible for membership. The schools collect food for their local food pantries. The schools compete to collect the most pounds of food. The school that collects the most food receives a check from the chapter for \$50 to donate to their local food pantry.
